Inuit + Researcher Community Based Monitoring

Ekaluktutiak Hunters & Trappers Organization monitor wildlife and collect samples. Then researchers at Kutz Research Lab take the samples and identify bacteria and parasites with genomics.

They work together to support country food safety and sovereignty.
